

### From the West

Brethren,

The duties of the Senior Warden are many. The following is an excerpt from, "Freemasons for Dummies". Which is a very inciteful reference for any one in or thinking of becoming part of the craft.

"The Senior Warden sits in the west, symbolic of the setting sun, and assists the Worshipful Master in opening and closing the lodge. He is the second in command, like the vice president, and if the Master is unable to attend the meeting, he may open and conduct business. His ancient duties were to pay the Craft their wages and to handle disputes among the workers. These days, he's just a heartbeat away from the east, so his task is to support the Master and to prepare himself for that office for the following year."

"The Senior Warden and the Junior Warden often have small wooden columns on the pedestals in front of their positions. When the lodge is at work (during a meeting), the Senior Warden's column stands upright, and the Junior Warden's column is laid on its side, showing that the Senior Warden is now in charge of the Craftsmen. When the work is concluded and the lodge retires to refreshment, the Junior Warden's column is raised, and the Senior Warden's is laid down, showing that the Craftsmen are now under the supervision of the Junior Warden."

"The Senior Warden's jewel of office is the level, a stonemason's instrument used to check the level of horizontal surfaces. It symbolizes that all Masons meet on the level, without regard to social, political, or religious status."

As members it is important to understand the roles of the officers in the lodge. Feel free to ask any of the officers what their role is. It might not only be a learning experience for you, but for them as well.

### From the South

..Greetings from the South.

Last month I began writing my monthly article with a little background and history of our Past Master century ago. This month, and in subsequent months, I will move forward a decade at a time and provide insight on the great men who served our lodge as Worshipful Masters. As a side note, the men that served in between are no less deserving of our gratitude and remembrance.

I hope you will all take time to review and walk the rows of pictures adorning the North wall of our lodge. All these men are as much a foundation of the lodge as the cornerstone in the NE corner of our building.

Ninety years ago, marked one of the worst years during the great depression. One in four people were unemployed. A long drought in the Midwest, stripped the topsoil from farms creating dust bowls and greatly affected agriculture. 1933 was certainly going to be a challenging year for Masonry in general and the Lodge of Oriental 20.

Oriental's WM for that year was born in 1882, in Burnett, Dodge County, Wisconsin. He first worked as a clerk with the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad. Sometime around 1908, after changing jobs a few times in the upper Midwest, he came to Arizona. Near Mammoth, he worked at the Copper Creek Mining Company, where he served four years as an accountant. In 1912, he moved his family to Mesa and took up farming (Part of his farm is now the site of Mesa High School). He farmed for about four years and then returned to accounting.

On October 7th, 1927, he was appointed Postmaster for Mesa by then President Coolidge. He served in this position for ten years.

A wise person once told me that, "Leadership is a quality that shows up when it is most needed." I would surmise this was the case in 1933. Years of accounting experience, a little over five years into his job as postmaster and having experienced three years of the great depression, PM Henry Merrill Hall had the skills and knowledge to lead Oriental 20 through this time.

PM Henry went on to serve Oriental 20 as Secretary for 30 years! He was also a past worthy patron of Eastern Star, past president of the Hiram Club, and member of the Shrine and Scottish Rite.

One constant in life is change and change is always a challenge. The challenges facing our lodge from it's beginning have been met by our fraternal brothers with the will and courage to carry forward. It is my hope that all members of Oriental 20 are inspired by the contributions made by past and present brothers among us that, "show up when it is most needed."

# The Keys to Masonry

#### "Here's what I can tell you about Masonry, You get out of it what you put into it."

I think all of us heard a brother say this when we were first introduced to the lodge.



As a new mason yet to be raised or a seeker of knowledge regarding the mysteries of freemasonry, we are curious of what experiential events are hidden beyond the doors of the lodge room. We get glimpses and anecdotes of potential growth and enlightenment.

We see the masons who have come before us moving through the building. Some enjoying fellowship and good conversation. Some familiar faces and some new. Others scurrying about preparing for the evening.

This is a time when we had our eyes wide open, and our ears tuned. We may have felt a little awkward trying to navigate in this new social circle. Open to learning more, we step out of our comfort zones and do our best to interact. Away from lodge, we read books, watch shows and check out the internet for more information.

Most of us have heard of the book by Manly P. Hall called, "The Lost Keys Of Freemasonry". As a Master Mason, we know what has been lost and in an esoteric way it may relate to the lost keys he's alluding to. There are many parables, allegories, and metaphors regarding lost keys. I have one as well.

Here's my take on lost keys, they are not lost, they just haven't been found.

I have a couple questions for you. Since you've been a member and had a chance to experience Masonry, do you think what you put into it is what you're getting out of it?

And, are you getting what you really want?

Take a moment and think about it. There is no right or wrong answer. Be honest with yourself and then proceed reading.

Now that you had a chance to think about and answer those questions, I'm going to turn your world upside down. Let's look at it a different way. The last paragraph might strike a nerve or a cord. It may be the opposite of how you approach the craft. It's just something to ponder and also a way for me to bring up the point of this article.

It's about contributing something more valuable than any other currency. **It's Charity.**






